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Brethren, when God made a promise to Abraham, since he had no one greater by whom to swear, he swore to himself, saying, "Surely I will bless you and multiply you." And thus Abraham, having patiently endured, obtained the promise. Men indeed swear by a greater than themselves, and in all their disputes an oath is final for confirmation. So when God desired to show more convincingly to the heirs of the promise the unchangeable character of his purpose, he interposed with an oath, so that through two unchangeable things, in which it is impossible that God should prove false, we who have fled for refuge might have strong encouragement to seize the hope set before us. We have this as a sure and steadfast anchor of the soul, a hope that enters into the inner shrine behind the curtain, where Jesus has gone as a forerunner on our behalf. having become a high priest for ever after the order of Melchizedek.

The Holy Gospel Reading according to St. Mark (9:17-31) Sunday of St. John Climacus

At that time, a man came to Jesus kneeling and saying: "Teacher, I brought my son to vou, for he has a dumb spirit; and wherever it seizes him it dashes him down; and he foams and grinds his teeth and becomes rigid; and I asked your disciples to cast it out, and they were not able." And he answered them, "O faithless generation, how long am I to be with you? How long am I to bear with you? Bring him to me." And they brought the boy to him; and when the spirit saw him, immediately it convulsed the boy, and he fell on the ground and rolled about, foaming at the mouth. And Jesus asked his father, "How long has he had this?" And he said, "From childhood. And it has often cast him into the fire and into the water, to destroy him; but if you can do anything, have pity on us and help us." And Jesus said to him, "If you can! All things are possible to him who believes." Immediately the father of the child cried out and said, "I believe; help my unbelief!" And when Jesus saw that a crowd came running together, he rebuked the unclean spirit, saving to it, "You dumb and deaf spirit, I command you, come out of him, and never enter him again." And after crying out and convulsing him terribly, it came out, and the boy was like a corpse; so that most of them said, "He is dead." But Jesus took him by the hand and lifted him up, and he arose. And when he had entered the house, his disciples asked him privately, "Why could we not cast it out?" And he said to them, "This kind cannot be driven out by anything but prayer and fasting." They went on from there and passed through Galilee. And he would not have any one know it; for he was teaching his disciples, saying to them, "The Son of man will be delivered into the hands of men, and they will kill him; and when he is killed, after three days he will rise."

<u>Today our Holy Orthodox Church</u> <u>commemorates:</u>

 Fourth Sunday of Great Lent: Sunday of St. John Climacus (Ιωάννης Κλίμακος) (+603)

This Saint gave himself over to the ascetical life from his early youth. Experienced both in the solitary life of the hermit and in the communal life of cenobitic monasticism, he was appointed Abbot of the Monastery at Mount Sinai and wrote a book containing thirty homilies on virtue. Each homily deals with one virtue, and progressing from those that deal with holy and righteous activity (praxis) unto those that deal with divine vision (theoria), they raise a man up as though by means of steps unto the height of Heaven. For this cause his work is called "The Ladder of Divine Ascent." The day he was made Abbot of Sinai, the Prophet Moses was seen giving commands to those who served at table. Saint John reposed in 603, at eighty years of age.

The Holy New Hieromartyr Zacharias (Ζαχαρίας) in Corinth (+1684)

He suffered for Christ under the Turks in 1684. The Turks accused him of secret correspondence with the Franks (French), whom the saint supposedly would have appealed to and promised to aid them seize the city. The Moslems in a rage fell upon the Christian bishop and, shackled in chains and subjected to beatings, they led him to trial. The judge without interrogation demanded that Sainted Zacharias accept Islam and, when he heard the negative answer of the bishop, he gave orders for him to be beaten without mercy. They then locked up the confessor of Christ in prison, where the fanatics did not cease with beating the martyr. The Hieromartyr Zacharias was beheaded on the third Sunday following the Sunday of the Veneration of the Cross.

The Kontakion of the Annunciation, (Τη υπερμάχω, Plagal Fourth Mode):

O Champion General, I your City now inscribe to you Triumphant anthems as the tokens of my gratitude, Being rescued from the terrors, O Theotokos. Weekly Wisdom of the Fathers:

St. John Climacus, the author of the timeless classic *The Ladder of Divine Ascent*, and whom we honor today, wrote the following about the basic principles of the Christian spiritual life for us non-monastics: "A Christian is one who imitates Christ in thought, word and deed - as far as this is humanly possible. He believes rightly and blamelessly in the Holy Trinity. The lover of God is the one who lives in communion with all that is natural and sinless and who neglects nothing good. The self-controlled man strives with all his might in the midst of the trials, snares, and noise of the world, to be like someone who rises above them...

Some people living carelessly in the world put a question to me: "How can we who are married and living amid public cares aspire to the monastic life?" I answered: "Do all the good you can. Speak evil of no one. Rob no one. Tell no lie. Despise no one and carry no hate. Be sure to go to church. Show compassion to the needy. Do not offend anyone. Stay away from the bed of another, and be satisfied with what your own wife can provide you. If you do all this, you will not be far from the kingdom of heaven."
